

## A Message from Your President

Happy New Year! Did you know that December 1st is the start of the Society's fiscal new year?

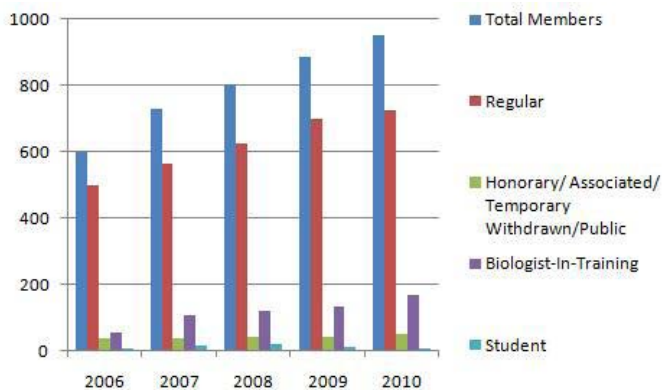


Figure 1. Annual Membership Totals from 2006 to 2010 (Source: ASPB membership database)

Some year-end numbers are starting to come in, with more to follow in future BIOS and the Annual Report. The Society has grown from 605 members to 951 members since 2006, a 57% increase (Figure 1). Growth showed a steady increase despite the 'economic downturn', or perhaps because of it. The Board is delighted with this rate of growth and anticipates further membership growth over the next several years.

This growth in membership has required increased process development and development of benefits to members, as well as ongoing maintenance of ASPB as a Society. The Board and volunteers continue to develop new initiatives and improve maintenance processes, with some recent examples that include:

- Hosting professional development events (**Webinars and Brown Bag Lunches**), such as:
  - o Worldwide Crisis, Local Concern: Amphibian Conservation in Alberta, presented by Kris Kendell of the Alberta Conservation Association;
  - o The Bow River Initiative, presented by Tracy Tarves of Western Sky Land Trust;

- o Alberta Bats: Recent Discoveries and Future Prospects, presented by Robert Barclay of the University of Calgary; and,
- o Wetland Impact Assessment **best management practices development**, presented by Rob Simieritsch of Alberta Environment (AENV)
- Developing a Brown Bag Lunch based on ASPB's Code of Practice
- Coordinating the annual conference, entitled "The Role of the Biologist in Industrial Development" (see call-out in this issue)
- Coordinating an insurance program specifically designed for members of the ASPB, through HUB International Insurance Brokers
- Securing the services of the new Executive Director on an annual contract basis
- Approving the Practice Review Committee's terms of reference
- Approving the new budget
- Reviewing awards' nomination forms and protocols

Volunteers have been and will continue to be key to the successful growth and maintenance of the Society. Volunteers contribute as little as 2 hours per month to as much as 100 hours per month, depending on the participation level required for a given activity. Volunteering for the Society will help an ASPB member collect points towards the Continuing Competency Program (CCP), a mandatory program since 2009 for all ASPB members. It also allows great opportunities to

## ASPB 2011 Conference - Calgary Zoo April 13-14, 2011

### *"The Role of the Biologist in Industrial Development"*

#### Call for Papers

The Alberta Society of Professional Biologists' (ASPB) 2011 conference titled "The Role of the Biologist in Industrial Development" will be held at the Calgary Zoo in Calgary, Alberta on April 13 and 14, 2011. Alberta's biologists are being increasingly challenged when working in Alberta's dynamic arena of industrial development. The intent of this conference is to examine the biologist's role in industrial development. ASPB invites submissions for presentations describing recent challenges, solutions and successes related to industrial development and the role of the biologist.

The conference will provide ASPB members, involved in industrial development, a forum for sharing new ideas and to allow industry representatives to understand the role of biologists in industrial development. Share your successes and challenges, facilitate new ideas, contribute to discussion and debate the issues!

Contributions should focus on the role of the biologist in:

- Environmental regulation and guideline development,
- Pre- and post-development biological assessments,
- Impact assessments,
- Monitoring, and
- Reclamation

Sectors of industrial development include:

- Non-renewable Resources (e.g., oil sands, conventional oil and gas, mining, natural gas)
- Renewable Resources (e.g., forestry, wildlife, water, hydro-electricity)
- Alternative Energies (e.g., wind, solar and nuclear energy)
- Municipal Development (e.g., rural expansion, urban development, infrastructure)
- Linear Developments (e.g., energy corridors, pipelines, transmission lines, highways)

The 2011 ASPB Conference Committee welcomes presentation abstract submissions for review. Target audiences include industry representatives, consultants, government, First Nations, environmental advocates and academia. Topics are not restricted geographically, but should be relevant to biologists in Alberta. Papers will be peer-reviewed; acceptance of the contributions will be based on originality of the work, relevance to the conference topic (focusing on the biological approach to industrial development), and overall quality of the submission.

An abstract should follow the format outlined in the Call for Papers available on the website at [www.aspb.ab.ca](http://www.aspb.ab.ca). **The deadline for submissions is February 4, 2011.**

Volunteer efforts are also integral to creating links between Society members, through de-centralization, as well as to the public, through participation on provincial-level professional committees.

### Decentralizing the Society

Daring feats (in my opinion) by some volunteers have provided the Society with technological advances, through webinars and on-line discussion forums. I hope that these will help to de-centralize the Society and regionalize our practice.

The Edmonton Professional Development Committee started hosting events via [webinar](#), and other brave and technologically savvy volunteers have been successful at some of the Calgary events. I am looking into hosting the Annual General Meeting via webinar (but I am not that technologically savvy). Our Executive Director, Ross, is currently looking into this technology and how to standardize its implementation to the organization. I was hoping that a member would volunteer to help Ross out with this project in the hopes that it can be de-mystified (mainly to myself) for implementation purposes at the AGM and for the Society as a whole. If you are interested, please contact me.

There are currently eleven discussion topics in the members' [Discussion Forum](#). Topics include Boreal Woodland Caribou, Alberta's Grizzly Bear, the ASPB Ethics exam, ASPB's endorsement of ASRD's procedural standards for Species-at-Risk, and most recently, development of best management practices for wetland impact assessments. This is a useful tool that can facilitate members' understanding of the biological realm of Alberta, as well as unifying approaches and launching innovative ideas.

I hope that webinars and discussion forums can help to de-centralize the Society and make us a more unified group, benefitting all.

### Professional Representation In Alberta

ASPB meets regularly with other professional organizations on a Joint Environmental Professional Practice (JEPP) Board. A recent meeting of the JEPP Board provided some interesting insight into the direction that the government is heading, and where the Alberta Government is looking to professionals to reinforce the standards of practice when sub-standard work is submitted and competency is questionable. Reclamation and remediation sign-off is still undergoing some hiccups, as practitioners continue to struggle to maintain high quality products while being competitive in price. The ASPB Board's approval of the Practice Review Committee's terms of reference and the ongoing development of ASPB's codes of practice, and professional development opportunities will serve to prepare our members.

I am proud to work with a group of such dedicated members and volunteers who have created such an impressive list of accomplishments. I look forward to having new volunteers aid the ASPB in meeting the growing challenges and taking us around the next bend.

## ASPB Board Nominations

The ASPB Board is requesting nominations for the following positions:

**President-elect**, which is the President 'in training' position. Responsibilities include participating in Board meetings, and chairing meetings when the President is not able to. Additional responsibilities include participation in Executive level discussions and decisions, as well as participation in whatever portfolio you volunteer for as a member of the Board. There are nine Board meetings per year held in Calgary and Edmonton. Meetings can also be attended remotely (i.e., by teleconference).

To qualify as a nominee, you must be a regular member in good standing and you will need to complete a nomination form. Nomination forms are available on the ASPB website in the Member Downloads. You will need signatures from three ASPB members. All regular members have three years to complete the exam on-line; however, the ASPB encourages regular members to complete it sooner.

## Government of Alberta News

### Alberta Invasive Alien Species Risk Assessment Tool

Alberta has a new tool to identify and evaluate potential impacts of land-based plants and aquatic organisms from outside the province. This will help government, companies and individuals coordinate early detection, rapid response and containment. Alberta's Invasive Alien Species Risk Assessment Tool, a web-based evaluation, looks at a species' likelihood of establishing and spreading, and its possible effects on an area.

The tool focuses on aquatic organisms and land-based plants. It is a key component of Alberta's Invasive Alien Species Management Framework. **The tool and framework are being piloted for feedback until June 1, 2011.** To learn more or to use the tool and submit feedback, visit [www.agriculture.alberta.ca/risktool](http://www.agriculture.alberta.ca/risktool).

An invasive alien species is a non-native species that, if introduced into the environment, can affect Alberta's native species and economy by degrading habitat and damaging agricultural land and crops. Societal effects may include odours, allergies or impacts on recreation. White oxeye daisy, for example, is not native to Alberta and can reduce hay production and affect the taste of milk from dairy cattle.

### GoA's First Nations Consultation Policy and Guidelines on Land Management and Resource Development

Sustainable Resource Development has implemented a consistent province-wide procedure to facilitate application of the Government of Alberta's First Nations Consultation Policy and Guidelines on Land Management and Resource Development.
